My parents often tell me how important it is to say "thank you" when someone does a favor for me, or gives something to me. A boy in my class mentioned that the main thing is to feel gratitude in your heart, but expressing it is not as important. Is this correct?

The Torah tells us that when one brings his **ביכורים** to the Bais Hamikdosh he not only hands them to the kohen to bring towards the *mizbeach* but he also must recite a few pesukim of gratitude to Hashem. In *shimoneh esrei* as well, we have a whole brocha of *modim*. From these examples we see that it is not enough to have the feelings of gratitude in your heart, but you must express them as well to show how thankful you are for something that is done for you.

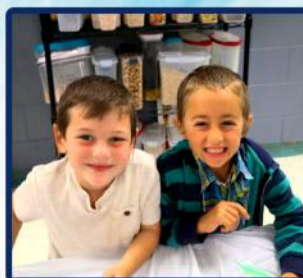

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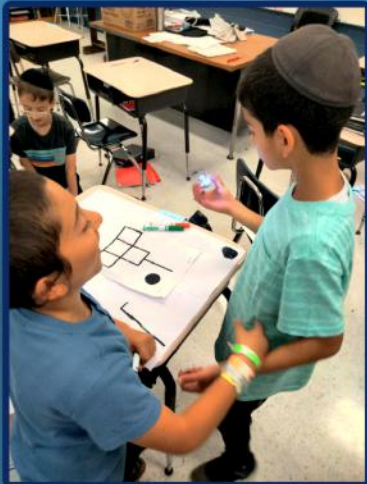
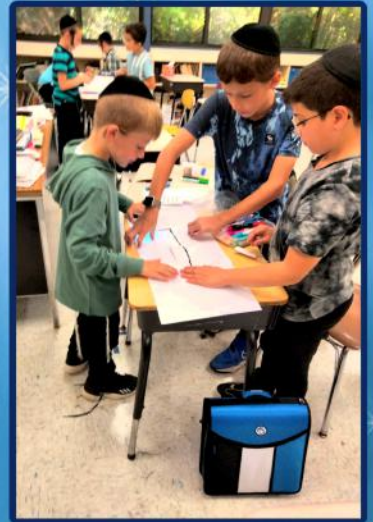
